

# Post-Secondary Education in Ontario: Managing Challenges in an Age of Austerity January 2013



## Methodology

- A total of 1,518 on-line interviews were conducted for the study between December 10<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>, 2012.
- The margin of error for a representative sample of this size is 2.5 percentage points within a 95% confidence interval. The margin of error is greater when looking at sub-segments of the population.
- The sample was designed to mirror the socio-demographic characteristics of the general Ontario adult population according to the latest census data.




## **The Political Environment**




### **Most Important Issue in Ontario**

Ontarians are most likely to identify the province's financial situation as the most important issue currently facing the Ontario government.




# University Education: Level of Priority for Ontario Government

Three in four Ontarians believe that university education should be considered a "high priority" by the provincial government.



# Provincial Issues: Present Level of Concern

"The economy" represents a high-level concern for Ontarians at present. The <u>quality of education</u> and <u>affordability of university</u> <u>education</u> also receive a moderately high concern rating from Ontario residents.

# **Education Issues: Tracking Level of Concern**


Compared to results from 2011, Ontario residents appear more concerned about the quality of education in the province generally. By contrast, Ontarians express less concern toward both the "affordability" and "quality" of university education specifically.

The affordability of university education in Ontario	7.04	7.33	-0.29
The quality of university education in Ontario	6.38	6.68	-0.30



## Quality of University Education in Ontario: Level of Concern

Over a third of Ontarians are highly concerned about the quality of university education in Ontario (rating of 8,9 or 10). The average concern-rating across the province is moderate at 6.27.




\*In 2011, this question used the phrase "post-secondary education" to refer to university education.



## Most Important Strategy for University Education in Ontario?

One-third of Ontarians identify <u>lowering or capping tuition fees</u> as the "single most important thing" the provincial government should do for university education in Ontario.



## **Job-Ready or Well-Rounded Students?**

On average, Ontarians were slightly more likely to say that "job-readiness" should be the primary goal of university education.

Job-ready: 45%



# **Conduct Research <u>And</u> Teach: Level of Importance**


Over three in five Ontarians believe it is highly important that universities conduct research as well as teach students. The average importance-rating across Ontario is a moderately high 7.86.





#### **Best Model of Delivery?**

Over two-thirds of Ontarians hold that in order to fulfill their mandate, universities must universities combine research with teaching.

## Provincial Government: Level of Control Over Post-Secondary Education


On average, Ontarians appear to view the degree of control exercised by the provincial government over post-secondary education as appropriate at its current level.

## **Ensuring A High Quality University Education: Who Do You Trust?**


Over two in five Ontarians say they trust university professors most with ensuring that students receive a high quality university education.






# **Sources of Information: Who Do You Trust?**

A large majority of Ontarians consider student organizations, university administrators, and OCUFA to be trustworthy sources of information about Ontario's universities.



# University Professors: Salaries & Working Conditions

Over one-third of Ontarians believe that the best way to determine the salaries and working conditions of university professors is to continue to allow <u>collective bargaining</u> between faculty associations and university administration.





## **Importance of Provincial Deficit Reduction**


Over eight in ten Ontarians believe it is important that the provincial government reduce the provincial budget deficit.






# **Deficit Reduction Strategies: Agree or Disagree?**

• To meet deficit-reduction targets, gov't should <u>override</u> the collective bargaining rights of public sector workers.




 Gov't should allow public sector workers to <u>freely negotiate</u> their working conditions and wages through a collective bargaining process.





#### Strategies to Manage Fiscal Situation in Ontario: Level of Support

A mix of stimulus and cost-cutting measures received a moderate to moderately high level of support from Ontarians (i.e., rating of 7 or above). Cutting funding for universities received the <u>lowest</u> support-rating on average.






# University Financing Strategies: Support for Government Investment

A large majority of Ontarians oppose increasing student tuition and cutting government spending on universities as measures to reduce university costs.



Almost two-thirds of Ontarians oppose the idea of increasing student tuition in programs expected to yield higher salaries after graduation.

# **Government Spending Freeze: Perceived Impact**

Over half of Ontarians believes that a government spending freeze on universities would have a <u>negative impact</u> on the quality of university education in the province.

Government spending freeze on universities	11 (+6)	<b>52 (-13)</b> ←	24 (+8)
Freeze on professors' salaries	12 (+6)	42 (-5%)	34 (+2)

#### **Deficit Reduction in Context**

Most Ontarians disagree with government measures to reduce the deficit in the context of three circumstances: 1) reduced education quality; 2) increased costs of education for students and families; and, 3) higher personal taxes.



# McGuinty Government: Impact on Quality of University Education




# Quality of University Education: Which Political Party Is Best?
