Kathy Foxall began teaching at Wilfrid Laurier University in 1994 and has since taught over 150 courses, making her an exceptional and long-serving member of the Department of Psychology. Kathy holds a master's degree in clinical psychology from York University and is a PhD candidate in the same field. Throughout her time at Laurier, she has taught an impressive range of courses—from Introductory Psychology to Abnormal Psychology, Personality, and senior seminars—in both in-person and online formats.
